Subject: Notice of Data Security Incident

Dear <<MemberFirstName>> <<MemberLastName>>,

Another Planet Entertainment (“APE”) is writing to inform you of an incident that may have affected your personal information. APE has no evidence that this information has been misused. However, the privacy and security of your personal information is extremely important to us. Therefore, out of an abundance of caution, we are writing to both inform you of the incident, and to advise you about steps you can take to protect your information, including enrolling in the identity protection services that we are offering at no cost to you.

What Happened? On April 9, 2018, APE discovered unusual activity within our email system. Upon discovering the activity, we took immediate steps to secure our email and network systems. We also launched an investigation and engaged a leading forensics firm to determine what happened and whether personal information had been affected by the incident. Through the forensics investigation, we learned on July 17, 2018 that an unauthorized individual had access to emails whose text or attachments included some of your personal information.

What Information Was Involved? The information that may have been involved includes your <<ClientDef1>><<ClientDef2>>(name, address, and Social Security number)>>.

What Are We Doing? As soon as APE discovered the incident, we took the steps described above. We take the security of all information that we store in our systems very seriously and have taken steps to enhance the security of our email system and network in order to minimize the likelihood of similar incidents occurring in the future. We have also reported the incident to law enforcement to prevent fraudulent activity. We will cooperate with the authorities to hold the perpetrators accountable.

Though we are not aware that any potentially impacted information has been misused, we are nonetheless providing you with information about steps you can take to protect your personal information.

To help relieve concerns and restore confidence following this incident, we have secured the services of Kroll to provide identity monitoring at no cost to you for one year. Kroll is a global leader in risk mitigation and response, and their team has extensive experience helping people who have sustained an unintentional exposure of confidential data. Your identity monitoring services include Credit Monitoring, Fraud Consultation, and Identity Theft Restoration.

STEPS YOU CAN TAKE TO FURTHER PROTECT YOUR INFORMATION

Review Your Account Statements and Notify Law Enforcement of Suspicious Activity: As a precautionary measure, we recommend that you remain vigilant and review your account statements and credit reports closely. If you detect any suspicious activity on an account, you should promptly notify the financial institution or company with which the account is maintained. You should also promptly report any fraudulent activity or any suspected incidence of identity theft to proper law enforcement authorities, your state attorney general, and/or the Federal Trade Commission (the "FTC").

Copy of Credit Report: You may obtain a free copy of your credit report from each of the three major credit reporting agencies once every 12 months by visiting <http://www.annualcreditreport.com/>, calling toll-free 877-322-8228, or by completing an Annual Credit Report Request Form and mailing it to Annual Credit Report Request Service, P.O. Box 105281, Atlanta, GA 30348. You can also contact one of the following three national credit reporting agencies:

Fraud Alert: You may want to consider placing a fraud alert on your credit report. An initial fraud alert is free and will stay on your credit file for at least 90 days. The alert informs creditors of possible fraudulent activity within your report and requests that the creditor contact you prior to establishing any accounts in your name. To place a fraud alert on your credit report, contact any of the three credit reporting agencies identified above. Additional information is available at <http://www.annualcreditreport.com>.

Security Freeze: In some U.S. states, you have the right to put a security freeze on your credit file. This will prevent new credit from being opened in your name without the use of a PIN number that is issued to you when you initiate the freeze. A security freeze is designed to prevent potential creditors from accessing your credit report without your consent. As a result, using a security freeze may interfere with or delay your ability to obtain credit. You must separately place a security freeze on your credit file with each credit reporting agency. If you request a security freeze from a consumer reporting agency there may be a fee up to \$10 to place, lift or remove the security freeze. In order to place a security freeze, you may be required to provide the consumer reporting agency with information that identifies you including your full name, Social Security number, date of birth, current and previous addresses, a copy of your state-issued identification card, and a recent utility bill, bank statement or insurance statement.

Additional Free Resources: You can obtain information from the consumer reporting agencies, the FTC or from your respective state Attorney General about steps you can take toward preventing identity theft. You may report suspected identity theft to local law enforcement, including to the FTC or to the Attorney General in your state.
